2023 JSBTC Day Message from the Office of the Bishop



"If one walks looking far ahead and pays no attention to the ground beneath his feet, he will stumble. If one gazes critically upon others and forgets to look into the self, he will bring tragedy upon himself."

"Record of Sayings from Rennyo Shonin's Life,"

In October 1904, the first documented assembly of devout Buddhists took place in Vancouver. Fourteen local Buddhist leaders met to request an assignment of a minister from Nishi Hongwanji (our mother temple) in Kyoto, Japan.

Rev. Senju Sasaki was appointed as the first Kaikyoshi (overseas minister) for Canada arriving in Vancouver with his wife in October of 1905. With the minister's arrival, the local Buddhists formed the Vancouver Nihon Bukkyo-kai (Japanese Buddhist Association), and thus began our history.

Reflecting on the past, I wonder how those fourteen dedicated Buddhists would feel if they could witness the changes that have taken place in our short history. There have been changes at the local temple level as well as at the international level. Many of the new immigrants sought available cultural and social activities as well as religious services including funerals, memorials, weddings, infant presentation ceremonies routinely provided at the temple. Over the years, while they were part of the temple membership, they are now independent organizations resulting in a decline in temple membership. Perhaps, our focus and function should be the Teachings. I think this is what the fourteen Buddhists wished and wanted to see as its future. Buddhism emphasizes the present moment and the self. Rennyo Shonin said, if we place too much focus on the future, we are not living within the Teaching.

An example of equality and inclusion is seen in which Christian churches are designed to be deep and narrow to show rank and status sitting at or near the front of the chapel. In Buddhist temples the hondo (main assembly hall) is wide horizontally and not deep, viewed as egalitarian in its teachings. Jodo Shinshu clearly has a universal and timeless appeal to everyone with its uncompromising equality and inclusivity. It is my hope that we will continue to walk the path of the Buddha-Dharma as our guide. Our temple exists to encourage each of us and others to appreciate the Jodo Shinshu Teachings and live the life of Nembutsu, Namo Amida Butsu, both as individuals and as a Sangha.


Statement on the Wildfires and Relief Effort in Maui





- for Japanese Canadian Survivors living in B.C.'s Lower Mainland





What is H.U.G.S.?

H.U.G.S. is a short term service that can help Japanese Canadian Internment Survivors navigate their health and wellness needs through government and community programs and services.

What does H.U.G.S. do?

H.U.G.S. provides a health care and community resource navigation service helping eligible Survivors to meet their urgent health and wellness needs. We guide clients to resources in their area and help them make a plan of action.

Who is eligible?

Japanese Canadians living in the Lower Mainland of BC who were born before April 1st, 1949, and who were impacted by the displacement between March 7th, 1941 and April 1st, 1949 are eligible. Contact us if you have an urgent need for short-term guidance or financial support.

How does it work?

You, a family member or a close friend can submit an application to H.U.G.S. If accepted, we meet with you alone or with others of your choice, at home, in our office or via zoom.

H.U.G.S. was established by the Japanese Canadian Legacies Society (JCLS) and operated under Nikkei Seniors Health Care and Housing Society.


