Throughout the last year, the world suffered from the pandemic of COVID-19, which brought tremendous hardship to many people, and we still are not able to see when normalcy would return to our world. On this occasion, I would like to offer my deepest condolences to those who fell victim to COVID-19 and express my sympathies to those who are currently undergoing treatment.

When social activities have been largely restricted as measures for preventing the spread of infection and protecting people's lives, many temples have been struggling for continuing their propagation. It concerns me that many people have been left isolated in the midst of hardship.

'Dependent origination' is a universal truth that Buddha Sakyamuni presented. This fundamental Buddhist principle expresses that every thing, matter, and phenomenon arises from various causes and conditions. None of us lives by ourselves. When the world is facing this unimaginable crisis, it is crucial that each of us experiences Amida Buddha's great compassion ourselves, and live each day to the utmost, having that joy and sensation in our hearts as the basis of our life.

It is my hope that your temples will continue serving as your spiritual home, and therefore, I sincerely ask for your understanding and cooperation to allow them to be so. With my heartfelt appreciation for each one of you, I would like to conclude my new year's greeting.

## **About our Tradition - Gobunsho**



The **Gobunsho bako** is a black lacquered box which is seen on the alter table used by the minister. The box contains the **Gobunsho** which are the letters of Rennyo Shonin, the 8th Monshu of Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha. These letters are generally read by the minister in a formal reading style at the end of a special service. The **Godensho bako** is a similar lacquered box which contains the **Godensho**, the traditional biography of Shinran Shonin. The Godensho is traditionally read in formal style at the **Hoonko** 

**service** which is the memorial service for Shinran held annually in January. At the end of the reading from the

Gobunsho, the minister closes the reading with the words, "Ana ka shi ko" repeated two times as he closes the book and raises it to his head. Roughly translated the words mean, "these venerable and awe-inspiring words are wasted on lowly beings such as we." It is a formal expression of extreme indebtedness and gratitude to Amida Buddha. The two official crests of Jodo Shinshu, the Paulownia and Wisteria crests are beautifully decorated on the boxes.



### ISBTC President's Diary, November 2020



Even though several COVID vaccines are nearing the approval stage, our infection rates are terrible, and it is likely that the next month will be a dire time for Canadians. Several provinces are back in lockdown, which means that most of the Temples are once again closed. I know that we are all tired and frustrated, wishing that life was "normal" again. Each November  $\pi^{th}$ , we gather at the Japanese Canadian War Memorial in Stanley Park to remember those who have fought not only in World War  $\pi$  but all subsequent Wars and Conflicts.

The Ceremony was an opportunity to express gratitude to those Canadians who have given the ultimate sacrifice.
