The Ho-onko service is the memorial service of our founder, Shinran Shonin, who passed away on January 16, 1263 at the age of 90. For Shinran's 33rd memorial service, Kakunyo Shonin, the 3rd Monshu (head priest) of Hongwanji (the mother temple) decided on the system of the ceremony to praise Shinran's virtue. For approximately 700 years since, Jodo Shinshu followers have observed the Ho-onko service for Shinran. This service allows us to recall and appreciate Shinran Shonin, and listen to the Teachings. This service is the most important service for Jodo Shinshu followers.

In the Buddhist denominations that enshrine Amida Buddha as the central object of worship, the *Smaller Sukhavativyuha Sutra* (Jpn. *Amidakyo*) is the most frequently chanted sutra. In the first half of the sutra, the adornments of the Pure land where Amida Buddha resides are described. The pond in the Pure Land is described as follows:

Lotus flowers in the pond are as wagon wheels. Blue flowers whine blue, yellow ones shine yellow, Red ones shine red, and white ones shine

Some people may think that it is simply natural for blue flowers to shine blue, yellow ones to shine yellow, red ones red, and white ones white. However, it is not a simple matter at all. There are so many people who do not recognize the unique talents that have been given them and go about complaining.

If we could just let our own unique colours shine, that is now "life" will shine brightest.

"3. Be Thankful to People Who Tell Us Our Faults"

We like people who praise us, even if they are lying. We are so easily taken in by people who cleverly praise us, and sometimes we pay dearly for our carelessness. On the topic of "The good and the bad, the

wise and the ignorant", Sakyamuni teaches us:

Good (people) and bad (people) differ from each other in their natures. Bad (people) do not recognize a sinful act as sinful; if its sinfulness is brought to their attention, they do not cease doing it and do not like to have anyone inform them of their sinful acts. Wise (people) are sensitive to right and wrong; they cease doing something as soon as they see that it is wrong; they are grateful to anyone who calls their attention to such wrong acts. Thus good (people) and bad (people) differ radically.

Foolish (people) never appreciate kindness shown them but wise (people) appreciate it and are grateful.


