<u>Jodo Shinshu Buddhist Temples of Canada Day</u>



The first recorded assembly of Japanese Buddhists in Canada took place in Vancouver in 1904. Fourteen Buddhists met to request a minister from Nishi Hongwanji (our mother temple), in Kyoto, Japan. Rev. Senju Sasaki was appointed to be a Kaikyoshi (overseas minister) and with his wife, Tomie arrived in Vancouver on October 12th, 1905. With the minister's arrival, the Buddhists formed the Vancouver Nihon

Bukkyo-kai (Japanese Buddhist Association), and our history began.

I would like to express my most sincere appreciation to all the Jodo Shinshu Temples of Canada (JSBTC), ministers, assistant ministers, national board of directors, and all temple members and non-members for keeping our organization active and accessible. Through observation at the local temples and the national organization, it is very clear that all ministers and national board directors across Canada are working tirelessly for the sake of our temples, for all members, and for the community at large. May I ask all of you for your continued support.

I once read the following passage, "Zen monks become depraved in the secular world" and "Shinshu ministers become depraved in the monastic world." I agreed when I read it, but I do not agree with it any longer. When I was in Kyoto, I once visited a Zen temple and asked if I could take a look inside. The reply from a young monk was, "We are occupied with other matters right now. Please come again on another occasion." It had the hidden message that the temple was not a place for sightseeing, and I was glad to hear it.

The Vancouver Buddhist Temple is a place where many activities are held. It is a place where people gather and have fun together. However, we are unable to do so now due to COVID-19, but we should not forget that it is a place where we can come together to listen to the Dharma.

In <u>Passages on the Land of Happiness</u>, written by master Tao-ch'o (562-645), it states:

Those who were been born first, guide those who come later, and those who were born later, follow those who were born before them, so that there is aspiration [of Tathagata] is continuous and uninterrupted. In this way, limitless numbers of persons who are wallowing in delusion may attain liberation.

On this occasion of Jodo Shinshu month, we should reflect and rediscover the lesson of those who were born before us, and thereby guide those who will come later. May we continue to discover joy by listening to the Dharma and together walk the path of the Nembutsu.

Message from the VBT Board

To date no public events or observances have been held since the pandemic lockdown. Aoki Sensei is available for small private family services, counselling and gatherings. Please call the temple to make arrangements with him.

We have scheduled a modified September monthly memorial service (Shotsuki) on Sunday, September 20th. While the maximum number of attendees will be 30, we are having a 10:30 AM service followed by a 12 noon service to avoid exceeding 30 people for each service. We ask that anyone planning to attend, to email or phone the temple a few days before, so we can plan the seating and other necessary protocols.

Some major changes are taking place around the temple. The city has now removed the homeless and the tent city in Oppenheimer Park and are re-establishing the park for what it was originally intended. The street in front of our temple is quieter and somewhat cleaner. Our immediate neighbour to the east on Powell Street, has secured a development permit from the city which means a major disruption next to our garage entrance. The new building will be 7 stories for general housing, social housing and store-front businesses. We expect to function fully without compromise during the construction.

The financial state of our temple during this difficult time has not been severely impacted, even with reduced revenue from tenants and no revenue from annual fund-raisers. And of course, thanks to our members generously donating to the temple to defray operating expenses we are presently not in difficulty.

On a sad note, we have lost Yasuko Komori, one of our hardest working, capable and dedicated long-time temple member. Our thoughts go out to her family for their loss at this time.

About our Tradition - Our Tradition-Offerings to our Temple

Buddhism was first introduced to Japan by Prince Shotoku (574-622). Prince Shotoku was the second son of Emperor Yomei. He was appointed Crown Prince in 593. Because of his deep knowledge and understanding of Buddhism he encouraged the promotion of Buddhism to all citizens of Japan. He studied Buddhism in Korea and became very knowledgeable about the doctrine. He is responsible for some wise statements such as "Avoid evil, undertake good", and "This world is illusion, only the Buddha is truth." Shinran regarded him as the Father of Buddhism in Japan. He was a very astute man and played a large part in shaping Japanese culture. His positive influence on the government and culture of the nation evolved from his understanding of the Buddha/Dharma. Unfortunately, Buddhism was much misunderstood during his time. However, he was able to show that the teaching allowed ordinary people of Japan to understand their true nature and it gave meaning to their lives. Prince Shotoku played a very important role in the development of Buddhism in Japan which eventually led to Shinran and the establishment of Jodo Shinshu as a distinct sect of Buddhism some 600 years later. In our naijin (altar) a scroll of his likeness appears on the far right.

Although October is usually bazaar time, this year there will be no udon and bento sales at the temple and the white elephant is in hiding, so please save your donation items for next year's bazaar. The board will be meeting soon to decide how we will proceed until the end of the year.

We would like to thank all for the donations we have received this spring and summer to help us deal with our finances at the temple (insurance and upkeep still must be paid). If you have not paid your membership or if you have donations, either monetary or ideas on how we can have a safe social event, please contact us. <u>Jodo Shinshu Buddhist Temples of Canada (JSBTC) Day 2020</u>

JSBTC Day is a special memorial service held by Canadian temples in October/November to remember and honour Jodo Shinshu Buddhism pioneers and followers in Canada. The month of October is important in Canada as it marks the historical beginning of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism in Canada: he first Jodo Shinshu minister arrived from Nishi Hongwanji (our mother temple in Kyoto, Japan) in Vancouver on October 12, 1905.

Traditionally, JSBTC Day has allowed us to gather at our local temples to collectively express our gratitude to all those who spread the Dharma Teachings before us. Unfortunately, this year, it is not likely that we will all be able to physically meet in October or November. Some temples may not yet have reopened while the others will be practising responsible social distancing and limiting the number of attendees. However, even if we are not actually in our temples, we can meet electronically to remember and honour those dedicated Jodo Shinshu followers and ministers and to honour those ministers who guide us today.

Last year, donations made on JSBTC Day went into the Ministers' Retirement Fund, recognizing the commitment of the JSBTC Board to ensure a sufficient fund to support our dedicated ministers as they take well earned retirement. This year's donations will be directed to the JSBTC Sustaining Fund.

Let us remember with gratitude those who have and those who continue to spread the Dharma. Please check with your local temple for the date of the JSBTC Day Memorial Service and let us all remember and honour with gratitude together as one common national sangha.

To make reservations for Meditation, you must register on our temple website and receive an Eventbrite confirmation for the date of your event.



Depending upon the demand, the temple will make more time available for Shotsuki service. The service will be at 10:30 am. When requests for that service is filled, a second service at 12pm will be held. The service will continue to be broadcast live through the temple YouTube channel.

Pandemic Guidelines

Upon entry to the building:

- masks/face coverings must always be worn
- sanitize hands
- complete questionnaire/waiver/contact information sheet (see an example on the next page)
- follow direction arrows and go directly to your assigned seat
 - household members may sit together
 - please do not leave your assigned seat, and remember to stay socially distant (2 metres)
- large bags and backpacks are not permitted in the Hondo
 - a plastic bag will be supplied

During your visit:

- line up 2 metres between households/bubbles and use incense from the small cups for Oshoko
- one person at a time in washrooms
- the Social Hall and Kitchen are not available for use

- exit either onto Jackson Street (Hondo exit) or through the garage


