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Winter is Coming



We now have two months left in the year 2023. There is no doubt that the weather is cooling as the days grow shorter. When the fall season turns to winter the leaves begin to change color and fall. I cannot help but remember one of my favorite haiku poems.

It may very well be one of the most famous of all. This poem was written by the Soto Zen priest and poet, Ryokan, who lived about 200 years ago in the Niigata area of Japan.

It reads:

"Ura o Misete Omote o Misete Chiru Momiji"

(Showing Front) ete (Showing Back) " (Maple Leaves Fall)

In this simple 17-syllable haiku poem, it can be said that the very heart and essence of Buddhism is revealed. In our mind's eye we can visualize the beautiful fall-coloured leaves fluttering down from the trees. We can sense the cooler weather and feel the autumn breeze. We unconsciously experience the Buddhist truth of impermanence in the changing seasons. There is a sense of naturalness of things being just as they should be. The trees and the leaves do not cling to each other; when autumn comes, when the karmic circumstances change, they part. For such is life. And as the leaves fall gently to the ground, they twirl and float, showing front and showing back.

Too often, we human beings float through life only wanting to show our "front," our "good" side. The

leaves fall without pretense and without concern for what is "good" and what is "not good." More than this, they have no concept of front or back, good or bad. We human beings, with judgmental minds, are the ones who create and assign such values.

As we are taught in Buddhism, if we open our eyes, the whole world is teaching us the Dharma. Throughout this autumn season, let us appreciate the wonderful Dharma message of the falling leaves.

Message from the VBT Board

In the early years of our temple, membership grew in leaps and bounds, because the temple provided activities such as a Japanese language school, arts and crafts of Japan, ikebana, bonsai, tea ceremony, as well as social and sports activities. This was available over and above regular adult and Dharma School services held every Sunday. Today, 100 years later, while we have a clean and modern building with a large hondo and one of the most beautiful naijin in North America, our membership continues to decline slowly. Membership that was once in the 500 to 600's, today is hovering around the 200's.

Jodo Shinshu is not an ethnic teaching. We must find ways to introduce the universality of Jodo Shinshu teachings in a way that will resonate with all North Americans. The message of Shinshu Buddhism is one of love and compassion. There are no rigid rules of conduct or dogmas one needs to accept. It is a teaching that focuses on truth and reality, not on petitionary acts and difficult personal practice. In our history of over 100 years, the temple organization has experienced depression, war and discrimination. Yet it has continued to sustain itself on our Canadian soil, as well as globally. Our biggest challenge for survival is ahead of us. Let us work as hard as we possibly can to preserve this wonderful teaching and share it with others for another century.

In the spirit of dana, we hope members and non-members will support our Lahaina Hongwanji Mission fund-raising efforts, by purchasing our October bento.

<u>2024 Membership Fee Increase</u>

Due to the increase in assessment fees to the JSBTC (our national board), the Vancouver Buddhist Temple will have to increase the membership fees for 2024 to \$125.00/adult member and \$35/student member. Membership fees are from January 1st to December 31st.

With the cost of inflation and living in an expensive province, such as BC, we are hoping to ease the financial burden to members who are 85 and over (born in 1939 or earlier). These members will no longer have to pay the \$125.00 annual membership fees, but must complete the membership renewal form to keep their membership active. The VBT would gratefully accept any donations in lieu of membership from these 'honourary' members, if they so choose.
